GCM started 50 years ago as Huron Campus Ministry, a joint initiative by the CRC across the University of Guelph, University of Waterloo, and Wilfrid Laurier University campuses. Today, Huron Campus Ministry exists as two separate entities - Guelph Campus Ministry and Waterloo Campus Ministry - but we remain linked in friendship and in a shared desire to be a space for faith formation and academic faithfulness on our university campuses. Currently, we have an extra special connection with WCM, as their interim campus minister is Melissa Burmaster, who provided leadership to GCM during my sabbatical earlier this year. The GCM interns and I also recently had the opportunity to join the WCM interns and Melissa, as well as many other CRC campus ministers and student leaders, at a student leadership retreat at Muskoka Woods.


GCM/WCM 50th Anniversary Celebration Overview

Excerpts from Speakers at the 50th Celebration

"In September of 1977, I began ministry here [the University of Guelph]. I left congregational ministry for campus ministry. The frontier of campus ministry challenged me to know Christ as Lord and King of All. In my previous pastorates, I had been involved in campus life. Our Reformed tradition fits so well on campus - Universities need to develop universal truth: God's truth. My mission was to support people seeing God in their lives. I loved doing so.

Now, after 50 years of sharing God on campus, we face the future. Secular belief has weakened in facing life's wars, hunger, and strife. God's renewal and wisdom is needed in response to our many difficulties, Campus ministry must meet our problems with the gospel. God's redeeming love is our primary gift."

"What I love/d about my time in Guelph Campus Ministry is that I could finally begin to be honest with myself and others about the impact of my disability on me, because there was never any question about whether I would be included. It didn't matter whether we were gathering on campus, at a student house, on a road trip or on a plane. If people from Guelph Campus Ministry were going anywhere, I could be there. Many students helped make this possible. Their tangible sense of support assured me that I was truly valued by our community. When necessary, on his own, Jamie [GCM's former campus minister] would somehow lift myself and my chair anywhere.

What I love/d about my time in Guelph Campus Ministry was my ever-expanding sense of community. In the fall of second year, my housemates may have gotten a little mad because I told them that I was throwing a "small pumpkin party". Next thing you know, 100 people were flowing through our doors, many of them my friends from campus ministry."

Excerpts from Speakers at the 50th Celebration

"In addition to building and nurturing its own community, GCM was at the beginning of what has come to be our dynamic multi-faith work on campus. Not long after I came to campus, I reached out to interview three of the original founding members of the Multi-Faith Resource Team (MFRT), Ed Den Haan, Michael Grand from the Jewish community, and Iftikar Sheikh from the Muslim community. Though we gathered on Zoom because of Covid, there was a remarkable warmth in our "Zoom room" among these three former colleagues. What has stayed with me is a sense of the real friendship that grounded their multi-faith vision nearly 40 years ago, a friendship which deepened over time in their work to come together in shared learning, shared advocacy, and bridge-building as they nurtured a home for faith and spirituality on campus. The MFRT at UofG was one of the first examples of multi-faith collaboration formalized at a Canadian university.

I was inspired by that interview and their storytelling and return to it often when I speak about the multi-faith work we do. Relationship-building provides the context where we can come to trust each other enough to work and struggle together, and where we experience what it means to show up for each other in times of pain and times of joy. I think about that now as we bear witness to the escalating violence in Israel and Gaza and hold the people of the region in prayer.

The relationship-building work that GCM helped to make part of our founding story, and that continues today is, I believe, a spiritual practice, as we hone our skills for noticing the holy in each other and in our world. It is for me a deep sign of hope."

"Sara introduced Sabbath as something not to fear or worry about - not a list of strict rules to follow, but as a gift. It became a topic in our weekly intern meetings and I found a way to make it my own. In undergrad this mostly looked like no school, little to no spending, time for practicing hobbies, and time for reflection/time with God. Keeping the Sabbath Wholly by Marva Dawn was my guidepost and a transformative read for changing my outlook and informing my values.

Eventually, my Sabbath practice followed me into grad school - and I actually attribute it to my getting into grad school. I realized that setting aside and honouring the time was a beautiful act in and of itself. It forced me to stick close to a schedule and use my time efficiently. I also learned that I needed to REST in order to work - rather than the other way around. This created balance in my life."
